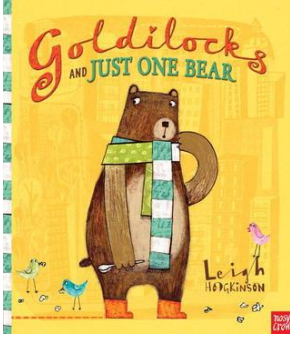
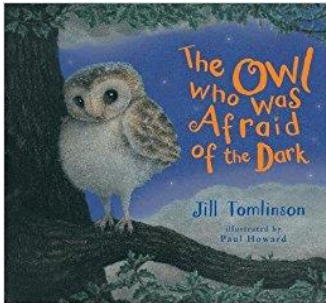


Goldilocks and Just one Bear by Leigh Hodgkinson

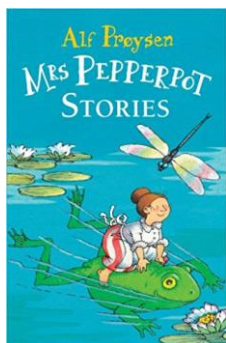

The Owl who was Afraid of the Dark by Jill Tomlinson

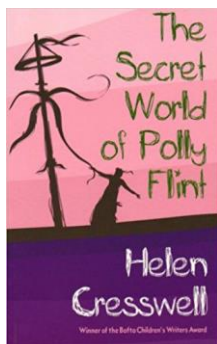

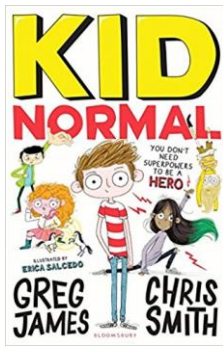
Mrs Pepperpot Stories by Alf Prøysen

Every Saturday morning the Greg family goes off to shoot animals and birds.

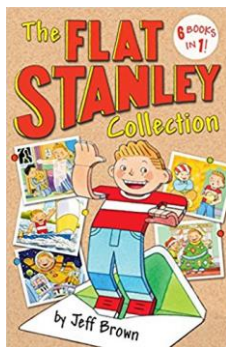
But the girl who lives next door hates hunting.

When a pinboard falls on top of Stanley he is left completely flattened. Sent to America in an envelope, will he be able to unflatten himself?

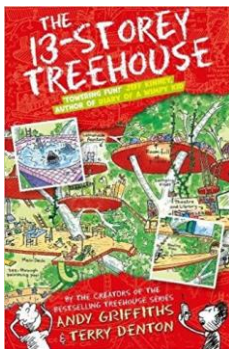


Billionaire Boy by David Walliams

Joe has a lot of reasons to be happy. About a billion of them, in fact.

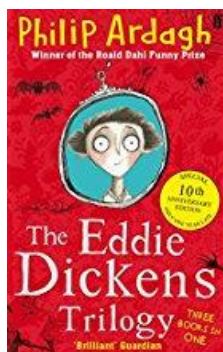

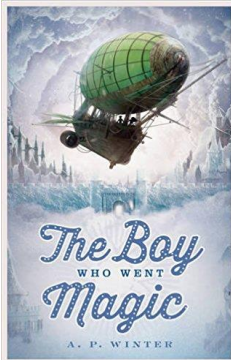

You're a Bad Man Mr Gum by Andy Stanton

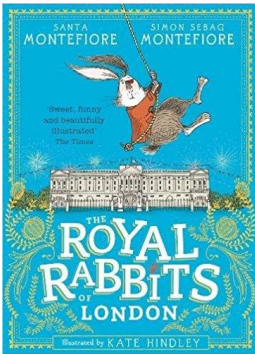

The Boy who went Magic by A. P. Winter

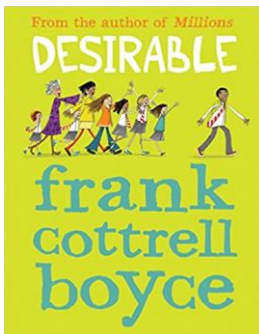

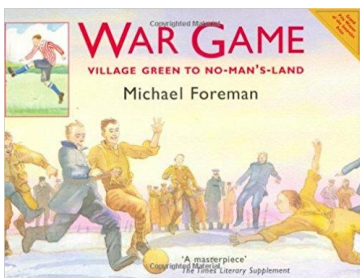
Life is an adventure. Anything in the world is possible – by will and by luck, with a moist carrot, a wet nose and a slice of mad courage!

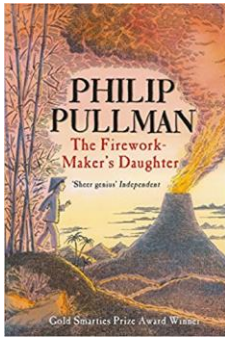

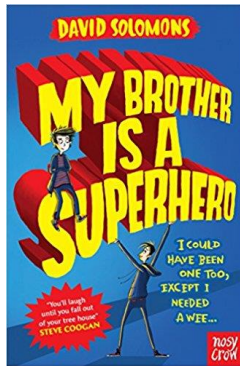

What Lila wants to be more than anything else in the world is . . . a Firework-Maker!

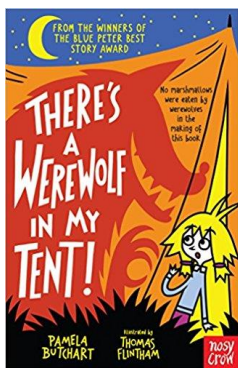

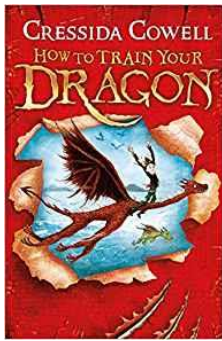
My Brother is a Superhero by David Solomons

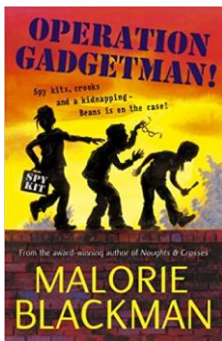

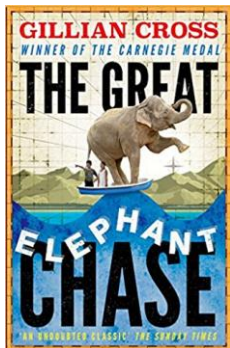
How to Train Your Dragon by **Cressida Cowell**

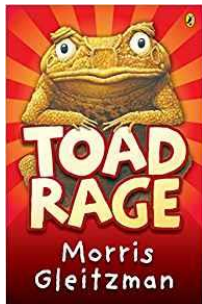
Gadget Man by **Malorie Blackman**

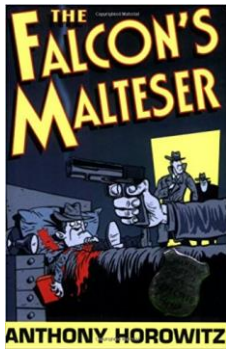
The Great Elephant Chase by **Gillian Cross**

Staying ahead means being faster and smarter - but how do you hide an elephant? Especially one with a mind of its own...



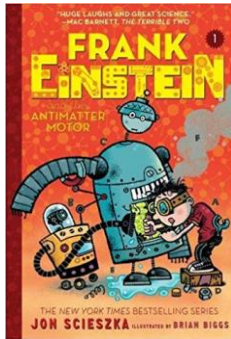
Toad Rage by **Morris Gleitzman**

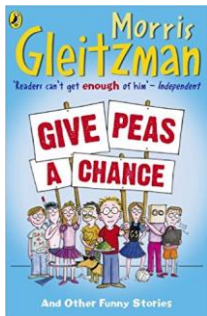
The Falcon's Malteser by **Anthony Horowitz**

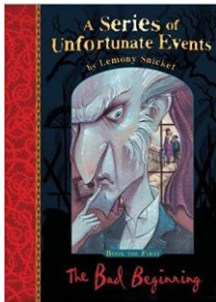


Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by **Roald Dahl**

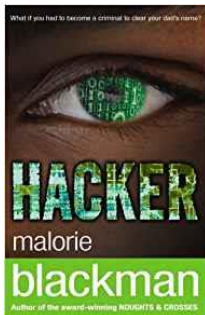

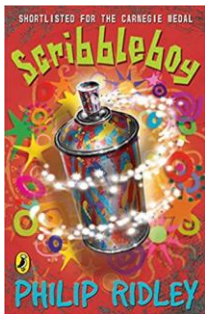
A Series of Unfortunate Events: The Bad Beginning by **Lemony Snicket**

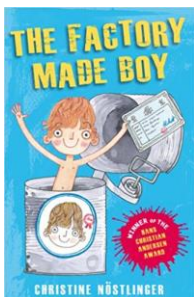
Hacker by **Malorie Blackman**

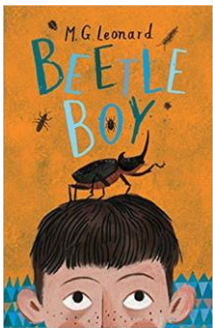
The Explorer by Katherine Rundell

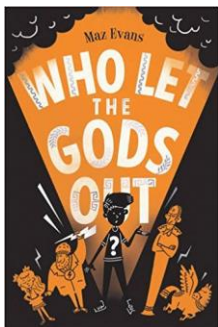
From his seat in the tiny aeroplane, Fred watches as the mysteries of the Amazon jungle pass by below him.

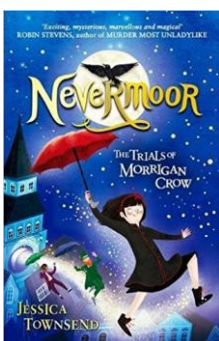
Beetle Boy by M.G. Leonard

Who Let the Gods Out by Maz Evans

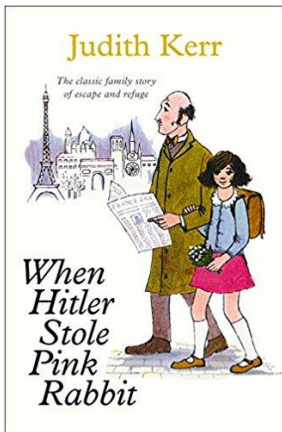

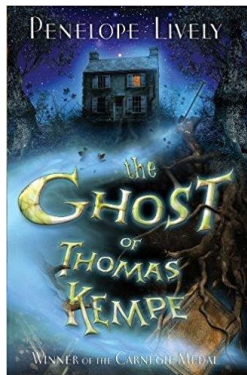


When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit by **Judith Kerr**

This internationally acclaimed story of one Jewish family's flight from Hitler's Germany has become a much-loved classic, and has been in print since its debut 45 years ago.

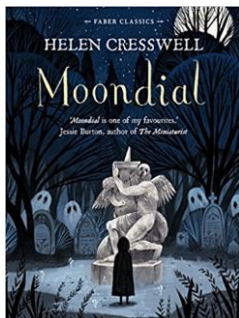

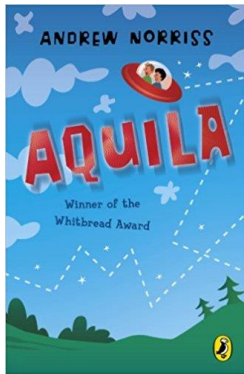


Moondial by **Helen Cresswell**

Minty is the kind of girl who notices things. Pockets of cold air on a stairway. Cries on the wind. Ghosts.

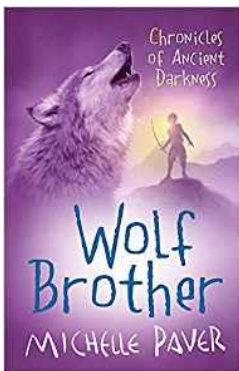

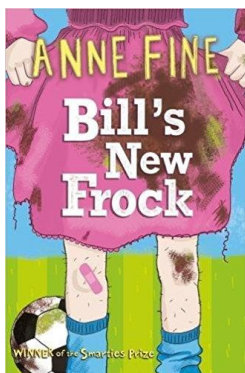


Wolf Brother by Michael Paver

A classic children's story from one of our best-loved authors, former Children's Laureate Anne Fine.

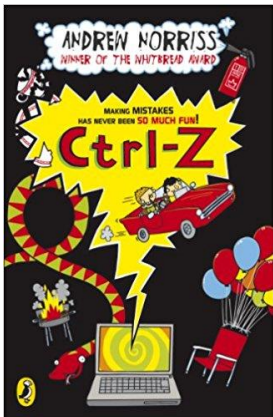

Ctrl-Z by Andrew Norris

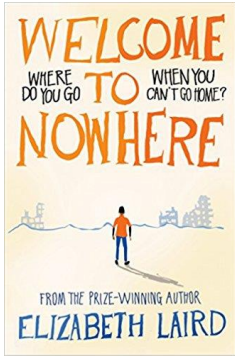

A Place Called Perfect by Helena Duggan

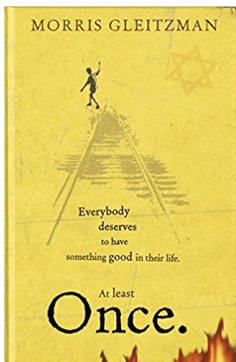

Everybody deserves to have something good in their life. At least Once.

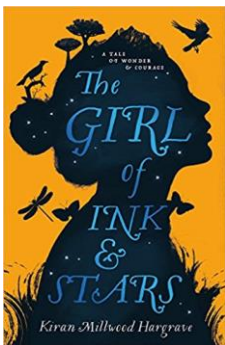
Once I escaped from an orphanage to find Mum and Dad.

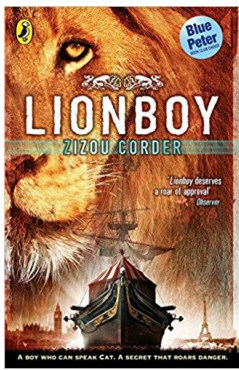

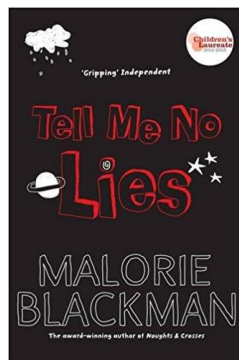
The Girl of Ink and Stars by Kiran Millwood Hargrave

Lion Boy by **Zizou Corder**

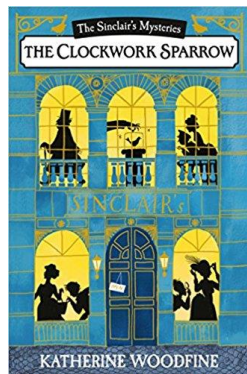

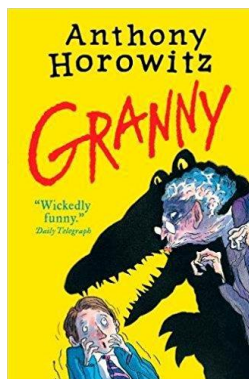
Gemma and Mike - two kids hurt by their past and now inextricably linked. Their effect on each other's lives will be explosive.



The Clockwork Sparrow by **Katherine Woodfine**

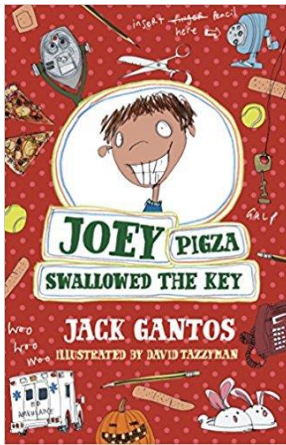

Granny by **Anthony Horowitz**

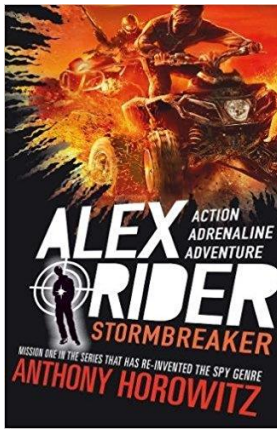

Joey Pigza Swallowed the Key by **Jack Gantos**

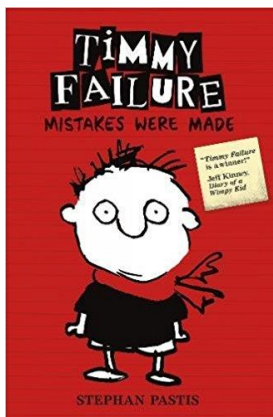

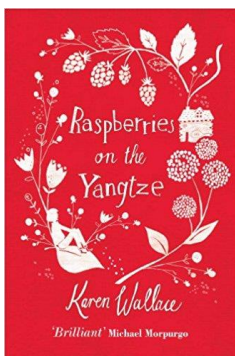
